REDISTRICTING MAPPING RESOURCES

Listed in order of recommendation. Start with the first in each section. If you want to compare or go deeper, explore the others.

For examining existing districts:

<u>FDPA website District Maps</u>: PA 2018 and 2011 Congressional maps, current PA House and Senate maps, as well as Detailed Maps by county and metropolitan area that show municipalities, and for some counties, school districts.

<u>Dave's Redistricting App:</u> PA Congressional, House and Senate maps, with statistical information and demographic data.

<u>Azavea PA House & Senate maps linked to Turzai partisan data</u>: PA House and Senate maps linked to 2016 election results and to secret data used in the 2011 redistricting process.

For mapping your own community, drawing your own sample districts or drawing an entire statewide map. These can be submitted as part of written or oral testimony.

<u>DistrictR</u>: a free, public web tool for districting and community identification, brought to you by the MGGG Redistricting Lab at Tufts University. Most useful for creating communities or a few districts, rather than for a statewide map. <u>Getting Started.</u>

<u>Dave's Redistricting App:</u> Draw your own Congressional, House and Senate maps, or start with an existing map and adjust specific districts to reflect your community better. Compare your map to other existing maps and evaluate demographic data. <u>Getting Started.</u>

<u>District Builder:</u> This is the free mapping software tool used by Draw the Lines for their Pennsylvania mapping contests. <u>Getting Started.</u>
